The biological father of my children was very abusive. He hasn't seen them in a long time. I want to remove his name from their birth certificates, and I want my new husband to legally adopt them. I don't have any money for a lawyer. Please help us move on and heal.

A

Hi Nicky, I can help you with this. The process should be fairly simple.

Use a [Petition for adoption](#) to ask the court for your new husband to adopt your children. Here are instructions on [Starting an adoption case](#). There are certain things the judge will look for in deciding whether to grant the adoption. Usually a person can adopt if:

- They do not have a legal disability.
- They have lived in Illinois for at least 6 months, and
- They have a good reputation.

After filing the paperwork, you will need to notify the children's biological father. If he consents, then he can go to court and sign a consent in front of the judge. If he won't consent, the adoption proceedings can still go on. The adopting parent can ask the court to decide that the biological father is unfit, or unable to care for the child. There are a few different reasons why a parent can be found unfit. Those are explained in [If the parents of a child do not agree to an adoption](#).

If any of your children are 14 years or older, then they will also have to give written consent to allow their stepdad to adopt.

Background of the Law

Adoption

There are 4 basic types of adoptions: (1) direct or independent adoptions, in which the adoptee is placed directly with the adoptive parents by the natural parents or guardian; (2) relinquishment or agency adoptions, in which the adoptee is placed through a licensed adoption agency; (3) related adoptions, in which the adopting parents are related to the adoptee, usually as parent and stepparent; and (4) adult adoptions, in which the adoptee is an adult. Samuel H. Young, William J. Dale, Jr., & Benson J. Barr, *Midwest Transaction Guide* §222.20 (2017). The type of adoption affects the procedures required by statute, particularly with regard to consents, surrenders, and releases, *Id.*

Adoptions are purely statutory proceedings. Samuel H. Young, William J. Dale, Jr., & Benson J. Barr, *supra* at §222.21. A person qualified to adopt an eligible adoptee files a petition, and the court investigates the suitability of the petitioner and adoptee. *Id.*

The petitioner can seek consent of the parents, guardian, or custodian of the adoptee. *Id.* A court hearing is held where the adoption will be granted or denied. If an order of adoption is entered, the clerk prepares a certificate of adoption which is sent to the Department of Public Health upon completion. 410 ILCS 535/16–535/17; 750 ILCS 50/19; Samuel H. Young, William J. Dale, Jr., & Benson J. Barr, *supra* at §222.54.

In order for a judge to approve an adoption, the rights of both biological parents must be ended. [750 ILCS 50/14\(e\)](#), [50/17](#). There is an exception if one of the two new parents is a biological parent of the child. In that case, the biological parent keeps their parental rights. However, the two new parents have to be married. [750 ILCS 5/212](#).
